Montpelier

Sunday Feb. 23,
1919

Breetings Father,

~~The~~ This quiet home down
land where living in now doesn't
supply much to write about.
But you must know that I'm
still living high - having an
enjoyable time - loafing mostly
and getting fat. But I don't get
letters from you. Perhaps you
expect me home before a letter
can reach me. Don't be fooled
like that. There's no telling
when I'll be starting to write
till you see me

Yesterday the Division put
on a horse show that was a
good one. We have some excel-
lent stock here and it showed
to good advantage. The Signal
 Corps has little wagon trans-
portation but we had three
entries and took a 2nd and
a 3rd prize - not bad at all.
It rained all day, but we
stood out in the rain to
watch the show. It was that
worth ~~while~~ while. The field
got pretty boggy and spoiled

The jumping!

I may do some theatricals. The Division show is being organized from the best talent in the Division, and the honor of managing it is no mean one indeed bringing \$5000 perhaps. I have been spoken to about it - but I'm trying to get home, and too there are others who seek the job. If I get it I'll be mighty proud - but I'm not counting on it at all.

I do however expect a trip to Berlin in the near future. The Signal Corps sends a courier with an officer each day from the 3rd army. It is expected that they will rotate it - thus the whole army of occupation and that the 1st Div. turn will come in a couple of weeks. It's a long way to Berlin but will get there!

That's the news, I guess. Just got the Stars and Stripes - and will mail it with this. Do you get 'em all right?
