Hello Kiddie,

What a joy think - I got
three letters from you yes-
terday - Isn't that great.
I had had later ones so
I knew that you were much
heartened when the armistice
was signed. I'll bet it
did take a big load from
your shoulders - and yet
all the time I was well
getting along fine, and even
enjoying the whole experience.
And now I can be certain
that the bloom will
come back to your cheeks.
Say you're stewing

an awful lot about losing
that job of yours. Wish you'd
forget all about it, and as soon
as it's finished just loaf till
I come home. It would do you
a lot of good - you can easily
afford it, and now that you
don't expect to hear of my
being shot every day you don't
need a mad rushing around to
keep your mind occupied. Do that
will you.

about increasing your allotment.
I haven't done it because I

haven't had the time nor the
opportunity to see our quartermaster.
We are so completely
marooned over here in Germany
that it is very difficult to
transact any business. Instead
I am letting my pay accumulate.
Haven't drawn any for Nov.
and probably won't need to
for Dec. Then I can send
them to you like that. It
may be better too that way,
because there is no telling
when I shall need some money

for a new outfit to come home
in. Just now I am fixed better
than most of the officers in
the Bu. but not too good at
that. we have to soldier pretty
accurately these days, and a
fellow has to look good. but
it is impossible to get any-
thing in the way of supplies etc.,
now to work. sending lots

and lots of love to you, and
a wishing that you'd rest, and
get in fine shape before I
come.
